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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

One of the premier institutions of higher education, North Kamrup College, Baghmara, established on 17th August, 1979 is situated in Bajali district of Assam. It is 12 Kms north from the head quarter of Bajali district. The NH 127A from Pathsala to Bhutan is running through Baghmara. Baghmara is a place known for trade and business. The landscape surrounding the College covers 33 Bighas of land. People residing in the locality are having diverse ethnic identity and colorful cultural heritage.

The people of the greater Baghmara felt the need for a higher educational institution and the first step in this regard was to establish a college in Arts stream. The public of the locality with their humble monetary contribution and cordial efforts came forward for this noble cause.

The College started and has grown in a remote rural area like Baghmara with everyone's contribution of the locality against many odds. The founder Principal of this College was Prof. Murari Mohan Dutta, a renowned educationist while veteran Physicist Late Dr. Paban Chandra Mahanta (Dean, Faculty of Science, Gauhati University) was the first President of the Governing Body and Late Dr. Ananta Mohan Das, a Physician and a social worker of repute had the privilege of leading the institution as the Secretary of the public body (Governing Body).

North Kamrup College vows to attain progress and run ahead in the days to come with the unsparing support of the students, the guardians, the society by and large and the alumni as it is launched and meant for attainment of excellence in higher education. Since its inception, this institution has been playing a significant role in the socio-cultural and literary field of Assam. Today it has emerged as a leading college in Assam by keeping pace with changing world.

At present the College has eight departments of Arts stream namely Assamese, Bodo, Economics, Education, English, History, Philosophy and Political Science which offers UG programmes. Additionally, the College offers four certificate courses and also provides hands-on training on weaving, cutting-knitting, mushroom-cultivation, vermicompost, and motor-driving.

Initially the College was started with the noble cause of providing scope for higher education to the youths of the greater underdeveloped area. The passage of time has brought the effort in the institutional goals in its periodic review to come to terms with the global need of higher education.

- The College has witnessed a consistent rate of student's drop-out.

- Most of the students belongs the economically poor family.
- Computer illiteracy prevalent in the office.
- Insufficient number of permanent faculty to carry on the increasing load of classes due to CBCS & NEP.
- Not having a proper mechanism to keep the record of students' progression and placement.
- Limited number of sanctioned faculty and office position.
- Record keeping culture is not up to the mark.
- Very limited scope for industrial linkage and collaboration.
- Non-functional hostel facility.
- Lack of vocational courses.
- The agro, socio-economic set up of the area is largely responsible for unsatisfactory student's attendance in the classes during harvest season.

Institutional Opportunity

- The College has a scope to develop the existing library into a well equipped digital library.
- The College has an opportunity to open Science and Commerce Stream.
- There is also a scope to open post-graduation course under the Department of Assamese in regular mode.
- The College has ample opportunity to upgrade the existing Certificate Courses to Diploma Courses.
- As a rural college, there lies a wide opportunity for the institution to explore the area of vocational courses on agro and livestock farming and impart the students skill development courses to make them self sufficient along with the traditional courses.
- There is scope for undertaking various research projects major and minor by the faculties of the College to solve the problems of the locality.
- The College has plenty of land for infrastructural expansion.

Institutional Challenge

- To retain the presently enrolled students overcoming the threat of mushrooming nearby colleges.

- Increasing the number of enrollment.
- To check dropout rate in the college.
- To introduced job oriented self financing courses.
- Limited scope for internal resource generation.
- To offer advance computer-course for students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Being an affiliated college to the Gauhati University, North Kamrup College mainly follows the Academic Calendar developed and issued by the University prior to each academic session. The College gets adequate representation in compiling syllabi for undergraduate courses. The institution integrates cross-cutting issues like- Professional Ethics, Human-Values, Environment, Gender, and Sustainability, into the curriculum. North Kamrup College also offers five certificate course namely, Certificate Course on Human Rights, Certificate Course on Creative Writing, Certificate Course on Basic Statistics, Certificate Course on Communicative English, Certificate Course on Traditional Art and Culture of the Bodos. The College, before the commencement of regular classes in each new academic session, organizes an Orientation Programme for the newly admitted students of BA First semester to make them aware about the prescribed curriculum. At the beginning of each academic session, the Academic Council holds a meeting to prepare a class routine, teaching plan, and academic calendar in line with the syllabus of all subjects. The Principal also directs all the departments to distribute the syllabus at the beginning of each academic year and all the educational activities to be undertaken. Faculties are encouraged to participate in various activities such as training programs, faculty development programmes, online and offline moderation workshops. IQAC of the College plans, monitors and records the educational activities of the institute. To monitor the progress of the students, student-mentoring system, remedial classes and special classes are made available in the College. Each department has procedure of conducting group discussion, seminars, workshop, field work, Project, downloaded video screening, teaching with ppt, using charts and models, brainstorming sessions. The institution takes feedback from students, teacher, alumni, and employers every year. Every year, the College organizes a parent-teacher meet.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

North Kamrup College has an intake capacity of 550 students for undergraduate programme. The College follows the state reservation policy for the admission process. The College has 16 full-time regular teachers and 5 contractual faculties who work dedicatedly for the holistic development of the students. To equip students with the technology driven world, the College constantly tries its best to use ICT tools in the process of teaching-learning.

In the beginning of each new academic session, the faculties try to identify the slow and the advanced learners on the basis of their performance in the classroom activities. Considering their individual differences, the needs of the slow and advanced learners are catered separately. To enhance the learning experiences of the students, the College adopts various student-centric methods such as seminars, discussions, debates, quizzes, etc. Along

with classroom learning, the College adopts various methods to provide students experiential and participative learning, learning by doing, lived experiences which can develop in them critical thinking and problem solving attitude. The College provides regular mentoring classes and remedial classes as per the need of the students. Along with the prescribed curriculum, the College provides certificate courses and also gives hands-on training on weaving, vermicompost, motor-driving, mushroom cultivation and cutting-knitting to encourage the students towards entrepreneurship.

Following the Academic Calendar of the affiliating university, the College strives to ensure transparent, time-bound and efficient continuous internal assessment. The College has a Grievance Redressal Cell which addresses and solves all kinds of grievances of the students inside the campus. In order to create a conducive learning environment for students, the College aims to maintain a good rapport with parents for which Parent-Teacher Meet is organized annually.

To make the students aware of the Programme Outcome (POs) and Course Outcome (COs), the College circulates the same among all the departments in the beginning of introducing a new programme and provide orientation to the students regarding the same. The POs and COs are measured through students' progression to higher studies and placement.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College has tried its best to create an eco-system for research, innovations and extension activities. In order to monitor research activities in the college a Research Development Cell has been formed. The Research and Development Cell along with IQAC of the college monitors the research activities of the college. It encourages the faculties for conducting research activities, publications, conducts programmes on research methodologies and Intellectual Property Rights. During the last five years, one Major Research Project funded by National Commission for Women was conducted and 28 seminars/workshops were organized by the college. 23 research papers were published by faculties in reputed national and international journals and 30 books/book chapters were authored by the faculty members. North Kamrup College also organises extension activities in neighbourhood community from time to time to as a part of social responsibility and to sensitise students on different social issues for their holistic development. The NSS Unit of the College also organizes several extension and outreach programmes from time to time. During the last five years, the College has signed several MoUs for academic collaboration and for providing skill based training to students. Under these MoUs teacher exchange programmes, seminars, workshops and students are also provided training on traditional handloom weaving, cutting knitting, and mushroom cultivation from time to time.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College prioritizes a strong teaching-learning environment with modern facilities. It features two digital classrooms, a computer lab with 9 desktops out off 25 for faculties and students, and an auditorium for organising events. Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities, including an annual Youth Festival with sports and cultural competitions. The campus includes a gym, yoga center, cultural museum, and various sports facilities. Other amenities include a canteen, clean & safe drinking water, power backup, CCTV surveillance, and separate common rooms for boys and girls. Additional resources like a women's hostel, boys' hostel, and a rainwater harvesting system.

The North Kamrup College Central Library, founded in 1979, has grown into a modern facility with over 18,300 books and access to various journals and e-resources. It features computers, internet, and photocopying

services, along with comfortable reading areas for students and faculty. The library also supports the local community and has a special section for competitive exam preparation. Staff members are available to assist users, and the library organizes orientation programs for new students to familiarize them with its services and rules. Overall, it provides valuable resources for both current students and the community.

The College enhances its teaching with upgraded IT facilities, including a computer lab, digital classrooms, and a seminar hall. It offers 100 mbps broadband, promotes electronic communication, and tracks attendance via biometrics. The campus is under CCTV surveillance, and a functional website and Facebook page provide updates. The library is N-Listed.

Student Support and Progression

The College initiatives towards students' support and progression can be highlighted with the following points:

1. Percentage of students benefited by scholarship and free ships provided by the institution, government and non government bodies during the last five year is 37.39.
2. Capacity development and skills enhancement activities are organized by the college for improving students capability- Soft Skills, Language and communication Skill, Life Skills (Yoga, Physical fitness, Health and Hygiene).
3. The College adopts the following for redressal of students grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases, Implementation of guidelines of statutory/regulatory bodies, Organization wise awareness and undertaking on Policies with zero tolerance, Mechanisms for submission of online/offline students grievances, Timely redressal of the grievances through appropriate Committees.
4. Percentage of placement of outgoing students and students progressing to higher education during the last five year is 7.2%. Percentage of students qualifying in state/ national/international level examination during the last five year is 10.25%. Student Participation and Activities the Number of awards/ medals for outstanding performance in sports, cultural activities during the last five year is 9%.
5. Average number of sports and cultural programme in which students of the college participated during the last year is 94%.
6. The alumni Association of North Kamrup College, Baghmara has been registered under registration of society's act XXI of 1860 with registration No. RS/BJL/274/03 of 2022-2023, it helps the institution in following area, Financial support and donation, academic support, games and sports, cultural support, social support.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance and leadership structure of North Kamrup College is designed to align with its vision and mission. The institute decentralizes its power and functions to ensure materialization of its vision and mission. The Governing body oversees the functioning of the College. The participatory governance system running in the institution which involves Governing body, Principal, IQAC, teachers, students and other cells at different levels of decision making and policy implementation. The structured administration with clear delineation of roles and responsibilities of stakeholder ensures smooth implementation of policies and functioning of the

institution. The College prepares strategic plans and policies for development of the institutions and are being implemented on due course of time. The College has established a faculty empowerment strategy that includes professional development programs, financial support for participation in training programs, seminars and conferences organized

by other institutes and a variety of leave options in line with Assam Government and UGC guidelines. The College follows rules stated by the Education Dept, Govt of Assam while recruiting new staffs to fill up vacant positions. Concerning the performance appraisal system, it incorporates Student Feedback. Analysis, and the submission of an annual self-assessment for the Performance Based Appraisal System. The College uses e-governance facilities in areas of Administration, Finance and Accounts, Examination, and Student Admission and Support. Effective financial management practices are essential for the sustainability of the institution. The College carries internal and external audit to maintain transparency of fund utilization. The Governing Body oversees the internal audit process. The College has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), which is crucial for maintaining high standards of education and

continuous improvement. The commitment to quality and excellence of the institution is further evidenced by its achievement of ISO certification. The institution is also registered in the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF).

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Regarding the interdisciplinary approach of NEP, the College has already been offering five certificate courses: 1. Certificate Course on Basic Statistics 2. Certificate Course on Communicative English 3. Certificate Course on Creative Writing 4. Certificate Course on Human Rights 5, Certificate Course on Traditional Art and Culture of Bodos The courses are structured so as 10+2 passed students may attend classes with flexible timings. Some of the courses also engage students in community services. The College has a vision to upgrade these certificate courses into diploma courses in future. The good practice of these courses is that lecturers with respective specialisation from outside are invited to take classes.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Regarding Academic Bank of Credits (ABC), the College is yet to introduce the system as our parent institution, Gauhati university is yet to introduce the system. As soon as Gauhati University introduces the system, as an affiliating institution, the College will also introduce the system.
3. Skill development:	Following the core concept of interdisciplinary nature of learning through NEP 2020, the College has planned to introduce various vocational courses. These will include various skill-based courses like cutting-knitting, driver training, computer application, yoga and physical training etc. Introduction and selection of vocational courses will be done keeping in mind the category of students and their economic capability to pursue the courses. It is because the college is located in a Tribal Sub-Plan area where almost 70 percent of the people belong to economically weaker category. Hence, offering affordable courses will be beneficial for both parties. The College will get students in those courses and on the other hand the students will get the basic level of knowledge or skill to get engaged soon. Additionally value-based teaching is being continued in the college. Department of Philosophy, Department of Education, Department of Political Science are focusing on imparting knowledge on ethics, human values, human rights, justice etc. Already we have a functional NSS unit and we are planning for NCC in near future.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using	In connection with Indian Knowledge System, the College has been practicing the bilingual mode of

online course):	teaching that is English and MIL (Assamese and Bodo). At the same time, Indian indigenous languages like Assamese and Bodo are offered as Honours and Regular Course of study. The Department of Bodo has also been running a certificate course in traditional art and culture as well.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The initiatives and efforts made by the College about the Outcome based education has already been uploaded in the College website: (https://www.northkamrupcollege.org/program-outcome).
6. Distance education/online education:	For the better benefit of the student community, the teachers have developed and uploaded study materials in the College website. The teachers prepare and use power point, video clippings, short films to make teaching-learning interesting and more effective. All the teachers of North Kamrup College use ICT tools including online resources, projectors, smart classroom, virtual classroom for effective teaching-learning process.

The students are evaluated through sessional examinations and assignments. The students are notified about the schedule of such evaluation programme in advance through the notice hanged on the notice-board as well as through e-made. HOD of all departments prepare schedule for their teaching, departmental class routine, departmental examination, departmental seminar, group discussion and assignments in accordance with their allotted time table keeping. The Academic Calendar and planned co-curricular activities of the College in mind. For seminar presentation, group discussion and submission of assignment, the dates are informed to the students in advance, regarding the sessional examinations, examination committee issues the notice and held the examination accordingly. In the semester course, the university reserves the right to set the questions of 80% marks in each paper in the end semester examinations and the rest 20% marks are internals. The College ensures the effective implementation of the internal marks through sessional examinations.

The final examination or end semester examinations are conducted as the schedules prepared by Gauhati University. Examination schedules are published in advance. Practical examination are held by the College and noticed for practical examinations are issued well before the commencement of the examination.

The institution takes feedback from student of last 5th & 6th semester, teacher, alumnus, and employers every year. The institution is organizing a parent-meet program every year for a good relationship between parents, institution and teachers.

North Kamrup College is affiliated to Gauhati University and is guided by the regulations framed by the affiliating University regarding examination and evaluation. North Kamrup College strives to ensure transparent and fair continuous internal assessment.

- Academic Committee holds meeting with HoDs to discuss conduction of internal examinations
- The internal assessment is conducted centrally by the College by forming an examination committee.
- Notices regarding internal assessment are displayed in notice boards.
- Instruction is given from the authority to submit question papers at least one week ahead of the sessional examination.
- To make the students aware of the pattern of final examination question paper, all the departments set the question papers of sessional examination following the pattern of the Gauhati University final examination question paper.
- Only teaching staff is deputed with invigilation duty.

- The sessional examination is conducted under proper surveillance.
- The marks obtained by the students are displayed on the departmental notice board.
- The internal assessment records are maintained both by the examination committee and the departments.
- Answer scripts of Sessional examinations are shown to students.
- The teachers discuss with students about their performance in the examination and provide them with suitable suggestion to improve their performance.
- Assignments are given to the students and collected on scheduled time.
- The departmental faculty decides the project themes based on contextual necessity. Proper guidance is given to the students so that they can prepare their project papers.
- Based on the performance of the students, the College arranges remedial classes for slow learners and special classes for the advanced learners.

North Kamrup College has developed a robust mechanism to ensure that the process of internal assessment is transparent, time-bound and efficient. The grievances related to internal assessment are also resolve promptly and effectively:

- Rectification of marks done by HoD if necessary.
- If a student fails to appear for examination due to medical or any other valid reason, internal examination is conducted for that student as per norms, provided that he/she submits application with proper documents.
- The College also has a Grievance Redressal Cell which addresses and solves all kinds of grievance of the students inside the campus.
- If the students have any grievance, they can approach the head of the department.

There is two digital classroom in the college that provides adequate modern facilities of teaching-learning process. The laboratory in the Department of Education offers other healthy learning practices. It provides necessary facilities to develop a standard level of teaching and learning. There is one Computer Lab in the college and there are nine desktop computers for providing computing facilities to the faculties and students. An auditorium cum classroom with 250 seating capacity (approx) is available in the college for organizing cultural activities.

There is one seminar hall wherein the programmes of Academic importance are organized for the benefit of the students and faculties. With an objective for all around development of the students the college always encourages its students to engage in various co-curricular activities. The College annually organizes Youth Festival Programmes where various competitions are held under the sports and cultural section. The College encourages the students to participate in various cultural activities. There is a good stock of traditional and modern musical instruments in the college. The college always encourages the students to participate in inter institutional competitions as well as state and national level competitions. The college has a good stock of articles for indoor games and outdoor games. The field of the College is a good platform for various events in sports week of the college and the total area of the field is 105916.88 sq. feet.

The College has a canteen with adequate facilities. Cold and hygienic drinking water facility is available for the students and employees of the college. For an uninterrupted power supply a strong digital generator is available for the convenience of the stakeholders. The college has a parking area for the students and the staff. Almost the whole college campus including classrooms and library are under CCTV surveillance. The College has also the facility of solar lighting system in the campus. The College appointed one night Chowkidar on contractual basis.

The College has a well equipped Gymnasium and both the students and the teachers practice regularly in the gymnasium centre. Gymnasium is equipped with modern gym equipments. The College has also a Yoga centre. International Yoga Day is celebrated every year in the college. There is a Cultural Museum

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The North Kamrup College Central Library was established in 1979 with a single room and now flourished with a separate building along with modern library amenities. The library is partially automated using SOUL 2.0 program and Bar-coding facility. The library is known for its excellent collection of text and reference books, journals and e- journals. It is well equipped with modern facilities such as computers, internet connectivity, photo copying machines etc. The central library has spacious reading rooms with comfortable seating arrangements for students and faculty separately. The library has an open access system that allows users to browse and select books from the schedules themselves. The library has a collection of over 18,300 books on various subjects. The books were classified using the DDC scheme. The central library has been subscribing 08 Journals, 03 magazines 05 daily newspapers and university news etc. The library also has N-LIST Program which provides full text access to thousands of academic journals, research papers and e-books. The library has a dedicated team of staff who are always ready to assist in finding and retrieving information.

The library has been maintaining footfall records in offline mode. The central library has various section viz., processing, stack rooms, circulation, periodicals, reference, reprography, reading room, newspaper reading section etc. It also provides community information service to the local people and organizations.

The NKC library has a special section for competitive exam to guide the students for their higher studies and employment. This section is also opened for ex-students. The central library has collection like question papers, college magazines, newsletters newspapers, faculty publications etc. There are total 07 CCTV cameras installed in the library with a monitor plus DVR.

The NK College library administration is governed by a library advisory committee formed under the chairmanship of principal as per govt. of Assam, HE department guidelines. The Library organizes library orientation program for newly admitted students every year. The primary aim of this programme is to acquaint the new students with the library services, rendered facilities and minimum rules and conducts to be followed while using the library.

The College library has the facility of Book Bank to encourage the meritorious and poor students in their studies. Preference is given to those students belonging to ST, SC, OBC, and physically challenged category. The library has been giving away a **Best Library Reader Award** for the students in fond memory of late Paresh Sarmah every year.

Each department of the college has a departmental library well maintained by the respective departments.

The future plan of the library is to upgrade to a fully automated library. It will also extend the community information service to a wider area and collaborate with the public libraries of the locality.

With the objective of upgrading the teaching learning process the college always tries to update its IT facilities. The College has one computer lab with nine desktops for providing computing facilities to the faculties and the student. There are two digital classrooms, one seminar cum classroom with audio visual and projector facilities and one auditorium cum classroom equipped with projector facilities. The College has a facility of internet connections consisting of Broadband and WIFI from RailWire with internet bandwidth of 100 mbps. All computers facilitate support with speed of 100 mbps in the campus. Electronic communications such as Emails and WhatsApp has been prioritized in order to encourage the

least amount of paper usages. The records of employees attendance are collected through biometric device. Almost the whole college campus including classrooms and library are under CCTV surveillance and sixteen nos. of CCTVs have been installed in the campus. There are two computers, one with separate printer and photocopy machine which is used especially for the office. Three separate computers with printer and photocopy machine are provided in the IQAC room and one computer in the Principal's room. Licensed software such as SOUL 2.0, Ramdhenu , Microsoft software are installed. There is a functional website for updating necessary information to the stakeholders. The College also has a Facebook page through which all the informations and photos of the programmes organized are shared with the stakeholders. The College library is registered with N-List facilities.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

Initially the College started with the noble cause of providing scope for higher education to the youths of the greater underdeveloped area. The passage of time has brought the effort in the institutional goals in its periodic review to come to terms with the global need of higher education. The College has worked persistently throughout to achieve its visionary goals and has adopted decentralized and participatory methods of functioning.

Governing body is the apex authority of the college administration and looks after the decision-making as well as other critical institutional functioning. Principal, being the secretary of GB, coordinates between GB and other internal-external stake-holders to ensure effective implementation of the institutional plans and policies. Teacher members represent the teaching fraternity in GB as well. The HoDs, Conveners of different Advisory groups and Cells under IQAC alongside the staff delegates assume a significant part in the dynamic course of the organization in arranging various arrangements to accomplish the general objective.

The IQAC, formed as per UGC guidelines, plays a significant role in maintaining the quality and standard of academic as well as non-academic aspects. IQAC ensures smooth operation of various facets of the institution through existing committees and cells of the institution.

Decentralization is further strengthened with distribution of authority to various committees, cells, and department heads. The organizational administrative committees include RUSA, Library, Purchase, Internal Complaint Cell, Anti-Ragging, Equal Opportunity Cell etc. The College has also constituted various academic administrative bodies such as Academic Committee, Research and Development Cell, Extension Cell, NSS, Women Cell, Yuva Tourism Club etc.

Annual academic courses, Skill based courses, Add on courses are decided after discussion with the Academic committee and concern departments. Various out-reach activities have been conducted by Women Cell, Extension Cell, NSS as dedicated service towards the society aimed at holistic development of the students.

A Digital Learning Cell has been formed to keep the technological aspect of the college up-to date and look after the operation of e-governance in all areas of the college. The cell also assists in smooth conduction of digital classes.

In adherence to DHE, Government of Assam and affiliating university directives, College has constructed the NEP core Committee and implemented NEP 2020 from the academic session 2023-24.

Response:

North Kamrup College has well defined policies and procedures of administrative setup. The college is a provincialised institution recognised by UGC under 2 (F) & 12 (B) and accredited by NAAC B+ Grade. The College is permanently affiliated to Gauhati University, Assam. It adheres to the rules and regulations of the UGC as well as the Directorate of Higher Education, Assam. The College is having three-tier system for its governance. It is governed by Ministry of Education, Government of Assam. At the management level the college is governed by the President, The Secretary and other members of the Governing Body of the College. At the College level, The Principal is the apex of the internal administration assisted by the HOD's, staff and IQAC. The College receives grants from Government of Assam, UGC, RUSA etc. and NAAC, NIRF, AISHE etc. are its benchmarking agencies.

The Administrative set up consists of the Principal, followed by HOD's, Faculty in charges, Clerks and so on. The organisation structure of the Departments at undergraduate level includes Head of the Departments followed by Associate Professors, Assistant Professors and contractual teachers. The organisation structure of the Library consists of the Librarian, Assistant Librarian and staffs.

Service Rules: For the service conditions and rules, the college follows rules and regulations laid down by the Education Department, Govt. of Assam.

Procedure for recruitment: The recruitment procedure is carried out in two ways:

Recruitment for Permanent posts (Grant-in-aid): These posts are recruited by DHE according to the norms of the Govt. of Assam and UGC.

Recruitment for Temporary posts: These posts are recruited by the Management of the college according to the norms fixed by Governing Body keeping in view the norms of the Govt. of Assam and UGC.

Procedure for Promotion: The promotion is allotted according to govt. guidelines in case of undergraduate courses.

Grievance redressal mechanism: The College has Anti Ragging Committee, and Grievance Redressal Cell for timely redressal of the student and the faculty grievances.

College Committees: Different committees and Cells are formed in the college from time to time to carry out different duties and responsibilities. It is through these committees the college authorities has decentralised the power.

1/Title of the Practice: Communal Harmony in the college.

Objective: The objective of this practice is to develop communal harmony amongst the Assamese and Bodo community students. This would also bring inclusiveness and a sense of belongingness for the latter.

Context: The College is situated in a TSP area of Assam. Baghmara is home to Assamese and a large number of Bodo community people. In order to pay due respect to their rich cultural heritage and tradition as well as to create a sense of ease for them, the college decided to include Dokhona and Fasra as a part of the college uniform.

Practice: The College has introduced a uniform for the all the students to ensure equality and unity. This creates a better environment for learning. pale yellow kameez along with a black dupatta and black salwar was decided for all the girl students of the college. However, keeping in mind the students of Bodo community and to develop a sense of inclusiveness within the campus, the college has decided to allow the Bodo girl students to wear their traditional outfit i.e., Dokhona and Fasra in pale yellow and green colour. This aims at bringing unity in diversity and a sense of brotherhood amongst students.
